L. Summary of my Activities and Future Plans

My research focuses on examining judgmental biases in forensic and legal decision-making, with particular emphasis on how social identities (gender and ethnicity) influence judicial outcomes and legal proceedings. Through rigorous empirical investigations, I explore the impact of stereotypes and intergroup relations on various aspects of legal decision-making processes including punishment, blaming, credibility etc. In collaborative articles, I have been instrumental in conceptualizing research ideas, conducting statistical analyses, and interpreting findings, contributing significantly to our understanding of bias in legal contexts. Looking ahead, I plan to expand my research program in several directions. First, I aim to develop and evaluate interventions designed to mitigate biases in legal decision-making. Second, I intend to explore how intergroup dynamics shape perceptions of justice and fairness within the legal system. Additionally, I am interested in examining the practical implications of our research findings for legal policy and practice. Through these endeavors, I seek to bridge the gap between theoretical understanding and practical applications in the field of forensic criminology and legal decision-making.
